## I.B.M. CONVENTION



## REPORT ON THE JULY MEETING

The theme for the meeting was "silk magic." **Bill Baber** performed "Meet the Missus." It appears in *Rice's Encyclopedia of Silk Magic*, Volume 2, where it's attributed to Harold R. Rice. The description in the Encyclopedia states that it is the American version of the English "Mr. and Mrs. Green." For those who have the Encyclopedia, the trick is in Chapter 12, "Mechanical Color Changes," pages 692 - 693. The effect was produced by Silk King Studios and was available through them and other dealers. A recent check with [www.silkkingmagic.com](http://www.silkkingmagic.com), operated by Harold's daughter, shows that the effect is still available.

Following the theme portion of the meeting, **Donovan Phillips** performed Bob Swadling's "Double Deception" and the use of a magnetic flipper coin. There was a brief discussion on the origin of the flipper coin, other gimmick coins and who currently is the best provider of gimmicked coins.

**Bill Baber** recounted the history of *Rice's Encyclopedia of Silk Magic*, the first 3 volumes of which were authored by Harold R. Rice with Francis B. Martineau as illustrator. Silk King Studios published them. The entire text was hand lettered by Martineau. The three volumes had continuous numbering of text pages so that volume 1, published in 1948, contained pages 1 - 520; volume 2, 1953, pages 521 - 1054 (534 pages); volume 3, 1962, pages 1055 - 1542 (488 pages). Rice died in 1987 and had sold the rights to the Encyclopedia to Hank Lee's Magic Factory and Magic City in the early 1980's. The fourth volume was published in 1993 with "Rice's" dropped from the title, authored by Mark E. Trimble with Trimble and Timothy Sonefelt as illustrators. The intent to continue the previous volumes is clear. The Martineau handwritten font was captured into a computerized font. The original Martineau drawings were scanned and then altered by computer to serve the needs of the fourth volume. The text page numbering is 1543 - 1854, 311 pages. There are ten pages of front matter and 94 pages of indexes covering all four volumes. The fourth volume looks much thinner than the original ones because it is printed on a thinner paper stock. There are reports of material that Rice had developed for a fourth volume, but it was not available to Trimble.
